- Your demo reel should be no longer then 1-2 minutes of your best performances. The demo reel could become your strongest tool when there is a close decision between you and another actor
- Casting directors and agents surf profiles and headshots on sites, such as "LA Casting," "Actor's Access," and Backstage.com" to find suitable actors. Make sure to have a strong presence on one or more of these sites.
- Print out your resume on an 8x10 piece of paper, so it fits on the back of your headshot. Make it simple for interested parties to quickly learn as much about you simply.
- Resumes differ for film, theater, and TV roles. Do the research before you attend an audition or casting call to make sure you have the proper format.
- Make sure to have both commercial and theatrical headshots on your casting and actor website. You want to have various looks that can play in the dramatic and comedic space.
- Attend acting classes and acting workshops regularly. This will help give your an edge over your competition, learn technique, and boost your resume.
- Send postcards with your headshot to follow up with casting directors, producers, directors, executives, and agents to thank them for taking a meeting
